Lloyd Potter Texas State Demographer Lloyd Potter was appointed State Demographer on June 4, 2010. Dr. Potter holds a Ph.D. in Demography and Sociology from The University of Texas at Austin, a Master of Public Health Degree from Emory University, a Master of Science in Education from the University of Houston at Clear Lake, and a Bachelor of Science from Texas A&M University. He is a professor in the Department of Demography at The University of Texas at San Antonio where he also serves as the director of the Institute for Demographic and Socioeconomic Research (IDSER). He has extensive experience working as an applied demographer in several settings.

Pia Orrenius Vice President Federal Reserve Bank of Dallas

Pia Orrenius is a labor economist at the Federal Reserve Bank of Dallas, where she leads the regional and microeconomics group and serves as executive editor of "Southwest Economy". She co-edited "Ten Gallon Economy" and coauthored "Beside the Golden Door", focusing her research on immigration and U.S. immigration policy. Orrenius is affiliated with multiple academic institutions and think tanks, including Southern Methodist University and the American Enterprise Institute. She previously served as a senior economist for the Council of Economic Advisers under the Bush administration. She holds a PhD in economics from UCLA and bachelor's degrees in economics and Spanish from the University of Illinois.



Ms. Alvarez coordinates data collection within the Texas Demographic Center (TDC) Population Estimates and Projections Program and assists with responding to data requests received by the TDC. She has experience working in the public sector on research projects and municipal initiatives covering topics including environmental policy and immigration.


Andrea Coker Chief Advocacy Officer North Texas Commission

She holds a bachelor's degree from Coe College, Cedar Rapids, Iowa, and a master's degree in gerontology from Baylor University.



Sarah Jackson Geographic Information Analyst North Central Texas Council on Governments

Part of the Research team at NCTCOG, Sarah's work focuses on GIS layer development and special data layer creation. These layers are used both internally and made available to the public through the NCTCOG Open Data Site. Sarah will be showcasing a selection of these layers and providing information on how to find and download the data. She will also discuss the Spatial Data Cooperative Program (SDCP), an annual costsharing program available to local governments and other entities in need of spatial data in the DFW region.



Steve Love President & CEO Dallas-Fort Worth Hospital Council

Mr. Love is President and CEO of the Dallas-Fort Worth Hospital Council, representing 90 hospitals and 100 associate members, with a mission to improve patient care and health equity in North Texas. With over 50 years in healthcare management, he has led in hospital operations, finance, and corporate governance, including serving as CFO of a Fortune 500 healthcare company. He has received numerous honors, including the 2020 D CEO Lifetime Achievement Award and the 2024 Theodore P. Beasley Distinguished Leadership Award. A respected figure in public administration, she has held key leadership roles statewide and nationally, and was inducted as a fellow of the National Academy of Public Administration in 2021. Opal is a proud UT Arlington alumna and continues her studies at Dallas Theological Seminary.

Daniel joined the Texas Real Estate Research Center in 2022. He specializes in building forecasting and decision models to help public and private leaders make better economic and fiscal choices. 
